No One Stands Against God Rev. Dr. David Balla Peace, Plainfield

"No one is so fierce that he dares to stir him up. Who then is he who can stand before me? Who has first given to me, that I should repay him? Whatever is under the whole heaven is mine." Job 41:10-11

In God's description of Leviathan, He pauses to drive home the real point: if no one dares to stir up a creature like Leviathan, how could anyone stand against the One who made it? The shift is subtle but powerful. God is no longer just describing creation - He's asking Job, and us, to recognize who He truly is.

These verses reveal the central truth of the book of Job: God is sovereign, and He answers to no one. "Who then is he who can stand before me?" That's not a threat. It's a reminder of reality. We live in a world where we often question authority, challenge systems, and expect answers. But none of that applies when it comes to God. He doesn't owe us an explanation. He doesn't answer to our demands. He is not on trial - we are.

"Who has first given to me, that I should repay him?" This gets to the heart of our relationship with God. Everything we have comes from Him. Our life, our breath, our salvation—it's all a gift. We don't bargain with God. We don't earn leverage. We receive grace. And that puts things in proper order. God gives. We receive. He is sovereign. We are dependent.

The last line says it plainly: "Whatever is under the whole heaven is mine." That includes the mighty Leviathan, the storms, the suffering, and yes - even Job himself. There's not a single inch of creation that lies outside of God's ownership and control. For Job, this was both humbling and comforting. It meant that even in his suffering, he had not been abandoned or forgotten. He was still within the care of the God who rules all.

These verses call us to lay down our arguments and our pride. They call us to stop approaching God as if we are equals. We are not. And that's good news. Because the One before whom no one can stand is the same One who came near to us in mercy. He who owns everything chose to love us freely, not because we earned it, but because He is good.

So when life feels unfair, or God feels distant, return to this truth: everything belongs to Him, including your situation. And if He holds all things, you can trust Him with anything.
